2 THE ACTION³

2.1. Description of the Action

2.1.1. Description (max 13 pages)

i. Explain the specific results expected, stating how the action will improve the situation of the target groups and final beneficiaries and the technical and management capacities of target groups and/or any local co-applicants and affiliated entity(ies).

The goal of the proposed project "Taking Action on Social Inclusion of Older People" is to further improve the capacities of 5 already-existing national CSO networks and 50 CSOs in increasing public awareness and impacting on decision making processes on social inclusion of older people in Albania, Bosnia Herzegovina, Macedonia, Montenegro and Serbia, at national and regional level. At Overall Objective and long-term impact level the various capacity-building measures will contribute to increasing the recognition of CSOs in Western Balkan countries by public institutions as important partners in good governance through their evidence based expertise. This impact is in line with and will contribute to the DG Enlargement strategy for EU support to civil society 2014-2020.

At Specific Objective level, the capacities of 5 CSO networks and 50 CSO network members to influence regional and national development plans and other legal/policy documents relating to ageing and social inclusion of older people will be increased. The expected outcome is that after three years policy makers in the 5 partner countries have included recommendations of CSOs in their policy making process. Further, there will be an increase in outreach of targeted CSOs through awareness raising and education to the wider public in general and to older people in specific. Cooperation with multiple stakeholders such as with UNFPA, state service providers and media will support that process.

Following results shall lead to the Specific Objective and outcomes as described above:

0) The inception phase will serve to set up or improve the network structure of 5 already existing CSO networks, including 50 active CSOs, some of them including older people such as senior organisation's and pensioner associations. Situational analyses will provide information on relevant stakeholders, gaps in policies and services and needs of older people and CSOs. Building on these analyses, each network will finalize their strategic work plan in consultation with national stakeholders, UN organisations and the European Commission.

1) The capacities of CSO networks and individual CSO network members in evidence based advocacy will be strengthened through trainings, mentoring, peer exchange and national learning meetings. Firstly, 5 national network workshops will provide essential knowledge on how to engage in evidence-based advocacy and how to define their research priorities such as access to services, social protection, violence and abuse, support to caregivers, ... Supported by experts as well as older people themselves, the CSO networks will thereafter conduct a research on national level to gain data for their advocacy strategies that will be developed. As a next step tailor made advocacy and communication/ media trainings will be offered for CSOs to gain better understanding of how to communicate these research results and advocacy strategies to their stakeholders.

2) National CSO networks will build on capacities gained in the first result and engage public and policy makers in a structured dialogue leading to better recognition of the rights of older people. CSOs will participate in at least 45 meetings in official policy working groups, add value through their messages based on experience and research, thus slowly influencing national strategies and other legal documents. Further CSO networks will organize national panel discussions to influence decision makers and the wider public. National campaigns will spread messages from research results and grass roots initiatives and will mobilise older people to take actively part in vocalizing their needs. Through actions for citizen education at least 5.000 older people will be engaged at community. Further 52 small local initiatives will reach communities through sub-grants to address gaps in service provision or carry out advocacy

initiatives on social inclusion of older people. The experiences and learning from advocacy initiatives/subgranting will be summarized in an advocacy brochure with good-practice examples and used for further communication with decision makers.

3) The capacities of 5 CSO networks will be increased on a technical level also through regional networking and knowledge transfer on social inclusion of older people. The countries all have similar institutional histories and therefore experiences can be shared more easily as the solutions can be reapplied in different contexts without the need for radical amendments. For that purpose a regional peer exchange program and a study visit to Slovenia will be carried out. A regional conference on social inclusion will serve to disseminate results, exchange experiences and good practices as well as to develop regional recommendations on social inclusion. The regional project website and the project newsletter (4/year) will regularly inform about ongoing project successes. The project newsletter and website will be available in national languages as well as in English.

Inception phase: 5 CSO networks and their strategic work plans on advocacy for social inclusion of older people are established, mobilised and refined

Activity 0.1. Conduct a regional project kick-off workshop

<u>Description:</u> A regional project kick-off workshop will be organised in Belgrade to gather project partners to reflect on lessons learned from previous regional projects (for example "Older people's Civil Society Dialogue in the Western Balkans", IPA regional project from 2011 implemented by three of the current project partners), to establish the procedures for implementation, reporting, monitoring, financial management etc. as well as to organise a training session on importance of research and data collection for purposes of advocacy. As research will be one of the crucial activities in the early part of the project, it is important to bring the full necessary set of skills and knowledge to a desired level as soon as the project starts. This meeting will also be used to establish a Project Management Committee (PMC), which will be made up of project staff from Red Cross of Serbia and representatives of the 5 other partners in the project.

<u>Justification:</u> The 3-day regional kick-off workshop will serve to introduce the project, present previous IPA network and lessons learnt from other networks and a monitoring plan and visibility guidelines will be jointly developed. A training session on research and data collection as tools for advocacy will be conducted by HelpAge experts in order to be able to lay groundwork for evidence-based advocacy. HelpAge as the biggest global CSOs working in ageing and related advocacy activities will provide expert input and examples from their practice.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: Improving skills of implementing partners by reflecting on past projects and receiving training in research methodologies; establishing rules for communication, reporting, management and monitoring as well as visibility during the project implementation period.

<u>Role of partners:</u> The Red Cross of Serbia will organise and host the meeting in Belgrade, the project partners will select participants from their countries, both from the project implementing networks and the public sector, provide inputs and experience. HelpAge will provide lecturers on use of data in advocacy process.

Duration: 3 days, beginning of month 2, 24 participants

Activity 0.2. Activate or re-establish 2 national CSO networks in Montenegro and Macedonia and refresh networks in Albania, BiH and Serbia

<u>Description</u>: A national kick off meeting will be organised in each partner country. The aim of these national meetings will be to present the project to the current and potential network members as well to other relevant stakeholders. The kick off meetings will be used to activate or re-establish the national CSO networks in Montenegro and Macedonia as well as refresh networks in Albania, BiH and Serbia (new partners, strategic planning). After the National kick off meetings, project coordinators in the project **EuropeAid/150147/DH/ACT/PRAREG**

countries will conduct a mapping of policy context to determine the current state of legislation, strategic documents and other papers of importance for the project topic. This exercise will identify policy gaps in each of the countries especially in relation to the various stages of EU access processes for each of the countries and the necessary harmonisation with the acquis. At the same time the exercise will identify the most prominent gaps in implementation of existing policies and recommend appropriate action. Additionally trough situation analysis the capacities of the CSO will be addressed and identified. This will be the baseline of the capacities of the CSO which will enable the follow up of the improvements in the capacity of the networks and their members to engage in the public advocacy activates. Other activities will include identifying active and potential partners in each of the networks, drafting of MoUs for networks that need to be established, conveying project information to new and existing network partners, and agreeing on the date for strategic planning for the project.

<u>Justification</u>: In order to have functioning and effective partnership networks in each of the project countries it is necessary to activate and galvanize the existing networks, refresh them with new members where needed and sign MoUs that will describe roles in the project. Situational analyses/ mapping of political contexts will provide basis for creation of strategic work plans.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: The outcome of this activity will be five national networks with active and informed member organisations, fully informed about the project and their roles in it as well as the clear idea of advocacy priorities in the subsequent period. The mapping of policy context in each of the countries will produce a national policy map that will be used in subsequent strategic planning.

<u>Role of partners:</u> The meeting will be organised and implemented by the national project manager. They will be responsible for bringing networks into the project implementation with clear information and all necessary tools. Network project managers will be tasked with conducting the mappings of policy context in their respective countries, which will be comprised of desk research and interviews with key stakeholders. The results will feed into the network strategies and work plans.

Duration: 1 day for the kick off meeting, 2 months in total, 30 participants per network

Activity 0.3 Revision or development of 5 network strategies for future planning

<u>Description</u>: Five national meetings will be organised for CSO networks in each. The products of these meetings that will be facilitated by local and national experts and representatives from service providers will be 5 network strategies summarized in strategic work plans that will reflect advocacy priorities and gaps that need to be addressed. The basis for these work plans will be the reports produced by situation analyses and mappings of policy contexts for each country (activity 0.2). The three already functioning networks will review their advocacy priorities and structures to reflect the new direction whereas the newly established ones will work on creating them.

<u>Justification</u>: Each of the national networks needs to produce or update their network strategies in order to clarify the goals, the actions needed and to include the project goals and activities into their agendas as well as to align them with national processes related to EU accession and harmonisation with the acquis.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: The 5 national networks will come up with a set of priority areas that will reflect each national and overall regional context (policies regarding ageing, EU pre-accession processes, reforms in health care and social care where applicable). Each of the networks will also refresh or establish new and clear procedures, policies and internal regulations that will facilitate more efficient functioning of the networks, better representation of members and better communication with the national and regional stakeholders. This process will also emphasise participatory approach in strategic planning, defining the priorities as well as network structures therefore enhancing the sense of ownership of members of each network.

<u>Role of partners:</u> The national network coordinator together with CSO network members will be tasked with the organisation of planning the workshop and ensuring the participation of experts in the field of ageing and social inclusion.

<u>Duration:</u> 2 days (1 night), 30 participants per network including partners, experts and representatives from CSOs, months 3-5

Activity 0.4 Summarize refined strategies and plans in an inception report (Inception phase)

<u>Description</u>: The regional project manager will lead the activity of analysing and summarising the five strategic work plans and situation analysis. The exercise will clarify the goals, demonstrate their alignment with the thematic orientation of the call and with the wider context of the EU accession process where each of the project countries is at a different stage. The product of the exercise will be the inception report, a document describing the overall advocacy goals and philosophy of the project across the five countries, the synergies between the regional partners and the vision for future cooperation between the national networks in the EU accession environment.

<u>Justification</u>: The inception report will be a strategic summary of the national advocacy goals as well as an outline of the available and needed capacities of each of the national networks to successfully work on reaching these goals over the project period and into the future, relying on national and regional resources, the capacities of its members but also the transfer of knowledge, experience and expertise from other project countries.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: The inception report will be a reference document throughout the project, mapping the ways to utilise the regional capacity to ensure strengthening of each of the national networks and keeping the joint vision on course throughout the project implementation period and beyond.

<u>Role of partners</u>: Each of the national networks will appoint a person to work on summarising the work plan whereas the regional project manager will be responsible to compile the inception report based on the 5 work plans.

Duration: 2 months, months 5-6

ER 1 – Capacities of 5 CSO networks to engage in evidence-based policy dialogue for older people increased

Activity 1.1. Carry out 5 national network workshops to provide knowledge on evidence-based advocacy and define research priority areas

<u>Description:</u> After the inception report has been approved by the EU, each network will organise a two day national network meeting (described in the activity 1.6) that will serve as kick-off for the research phase. The network meeting will be combined with a 1.5 day network workshop to discuss the policy maps and strategic work plans and advocacy goals will be defined. Based on this, each network will be defining research areas, e.g. access to services, social protection, violence and abuse, support to caregivers...

<u>Justification</u>: These workshops will be conducted to establish the ongoing political and policy-related processes in each country that can be influenced through advocacy during and after the project period as well as the gaps in information that need to be addressed through research in order to be effective with evidence-based advocacy activities. Again, this will be different in each country in order to maximise the efficiency of resources provided through the project.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: Each of the national networks will have produced advocacy priorities as well as inputs for the terms of reference documents that will be used in subsequent research.

<u>Role of partners:</u> The network coordinators will be responsible to organise the workshop, experts in the field of ageing and social inclusion will be invited to participate in the workshop.

Duration: 2 day meeting, months 7, first year, 30 participants per network

Activity 1.2. CSO networks conduct research on national level to gain data for their advocacy strategies

<u>Description:</u> After the workshops described in the previous activity have been completed, and based on their outcomes – advocacy targets and research areas – each network will go through a process of select an agency or expert to conduct the research. The research tasks will be defined in the terms of reference that will be produced following the inputs at workshops. Research will investigate phenomena relevant for the issue of inclusion of older people ranging from discrimination, abuse, access to services (health, social protection, and transportation), financial security, lifelong learning, labour market participation etc... Each national network will define the topic and scope of the research based on the national context.

<u>Justification</u>: The research will establish a baseline and will involve representatives of older people, interviews with experts, focus groups and questionnaires – depending on the topic and the suggested methodology by the agency or expert.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: The research activities will be summarized in 5 research reports that will provide critical data as well as recommendations for addressing the issues identified through activities described in A.1.1. This means that, depending on the context, new data will be produced or the existing data will be cross-referenced/ systematised to support the advocacy target per each country and the recommendations will be concrete and actionable.

<u>Role of partners:</u>. Network coordinators will be tasked with overseeing the production of publication of the research. External experts/ agencies will conduct the research.

Duration: 8 months in total, months 8-15, 1st year

Activity 1.3 – Conduct 5 national tailor-made advocacy and communication/media trainings for the CSO networks (one per country)

<u>Description:</u> An advocacy and communication/media training for key personnel of the national networks aims to build/ increase their capacity to advocate as well as communicate in their national contexts. These training sessions will be conducted by local media experts and will be a part of the second year national network meetings as described in Activity 1.6. These training sessions will also include participation of media professionals/ journalists from national and regional printed, electronic and digital media who will participate in the education but also be familiarised with and sensitised to the topics of importance to the network members.

<u>Justification</u>: Increasing capacity of key network staff to perform in the area of advocacy and communication.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: These sessions will put emphasis on the data collected through each individual research and the advocacy priorities per each country. They will especially accentuate the need to efficiently engage and communicate with the media in each country in order to not only draw their attention to the research results and advocacy targets but to increase their general level of sensitivity towards ageing and older people.

<u>Role of partners</u>: Network coordinators will be responsible to organise the workshop and liase with the media expert who will conduct the training.

Duration: 2 days, months 15.16, 2nd year, 30 participants per network,

Activity 1.4 Carry out 5 national trainings with media representatives, raising awareness about needs of older people

<u>Description</u>: These training sessions will be performed for media professionals/ journalists from national and regional printed, electronic and digital media who will participate in the education to be familiarised with and sensitised to the topics of importance to the network members. The topics will include the country, regional and global level processes of importance to the topics covered by the national networks as well as correct reporting language, examples of human interest stories and forms of potential future cooperation.

<u>Justification:</u> Building capacity of the media to recognise the work of the national networks in advocacy as well as building trust so that national networks are also recognised as reliable sources of information pertaining to the topics of importance. Guidelines will be developed jointly with media representatives.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: The media professionals will be familiarised with the topics and the language necessary to lay the groundwork for better social inclusion of older people in the five countries. At the same time, members of each of the networks will establish direct contacts with the present journalists and forge longer term relationships to ensure future coverage of network and members activities, better visibility of older people and the issues they face and overcome.

<u>Role of partners:</u> Organisation of workshops, logistical support, participation of journalists/ journalist associations.

Duration: 1 day, months 22, 15 participants

Activity 1.5. – Develop national research-based advocacy strategies by national CSO networks

<u>Description:</u> Each national network will work on producing a national advocacy strategy based on the conducted research using external consultants' assistance. The work on the strategy will be performed by the network members as well as other key stakeholders and experts in the relevant field and will be coordinated by the project coordinators in each country.

<u>Justification</u>: Strategic approach to advocacy is necessary to perform the tasks described in the project but also to build capacity for the years beyond. Advocacy strategy will be jointly developed with network members and other relevant stakeholders.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: By the end of the process, each national network will have adopted a national strategic advocacy strategy based on the performed research and the extensive work of network members and key stakeholders. The strategy will be presented at regular network meetings, discussed and adopted and will reflect both the advocacy priorities for each country as well as the respective capacities of national networks.

<u>Role of partners:</u> The project manager will be responsible for the overall process and coordinate the development of the strategy with the network members and finalize the draft. Local experts will support this process and give input.

Duration: finished by months 14, 2 year

Activity 1.6 CSO networks conduct regular network meetings (2/year)

<u>Description:</u> Regular network meetings for each country will be organised two times per year per each project country, each lasting 2 days and integrating training components. In this way it will be combined with the activities 0.3, 1.1., 1.3. 2.4. Further country and CSOs Networks specific areas of training will be identified (during the inception phase and in the network meetings) and planned along the national meetings. Besides the training, the meetings will be focusing on monitoring and reviews of the project activities (challenges, achievements in the past period, detailed planning – such as the research results, their presentation to the public, project activities, dissemination of learning (including regional), of country specific research findings, etc.) but will also be used to conduct internal network management activities – ongoing issues, new members, opportunities etc. as well as training workshops described in Activities 1.1 and 1.3. These meeting will, depending on the content also include participation of government representatives, UN agencies dealing with ageing, public service providers and different relevant public institutions in each country as well as media.

<u>Justification</u>: Primary justification is to ensure participatory, multi-stakeholder, smooth monitoring, reviewing, evaluation, learning, dissemination of the learned, coordination of project activities. In addition these activities will strengthen the networks, formalise their internal and external communication and provide avenues for new ideas and opportunities to be presented and discussed.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: The network meetings will be used as regular, scheduled meetings to plan the next steps in detail with network members and will be provided with opportunities to receive additional training and information.

<u>Role of partners:</u> Network coordinators and national project managers will be responsible for the organisation of the meetings. Representatives of public authorities, service providers and other relevant stakeholders such as EU and UN agencies will be invited to these meetings as needed, depending on the topic.

Duration: Two per year per country. Two days each, 30 participants per network

ER 2 – CSOs have engaged public and policy makers in a structured dialogue leading to better recognition of rights of older people

Activity 2.1 Conduct 2 national advocacy campaigns per network on occasions such as the Day for Older People

<u>Description</u>: Based on research findings in each country, these campaigns will be performed jointly with the media and will be ongoing throughout the project. Each country network will decide on the most efficient and effective campaign tools and they may include: press conferences, E-newsletters, websites, poster campaigns, bus campaigns, outdoor exhibitions, promotion of positive image of older people. Activities supported through sub-grants of the project may also be used as a source of real life examples of inclusion and activism of older people and to challenge preconceptions about older people as passive **EuropeAid/150147/DH/ACT/PRAREG**

members of communities. Messages from grass-root initiatives, their press releases, video clips, and brochures will also be used and presented in each of the national contexts.

<u>Justification</u>: The strength of each national network will be demonstrated by using examples of successful, small scale, local, grassroots initiatives and activities to mobilise not only the public at national level but also decision and policy makers to act.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: Each national campaign will use real models from each of the national contexts to address the public and the key decision makers, as well as to support its own strategic advocacy goals defined through previous activities.

<u>Role of partners:</u> Network coordinators will be in charge of organising the campaigns with the network members as well as to choose the design and communicate with the media as well as to document the campaign (e.g. dissemination list, media reports).

<u>Duration:</u> 2nd and 3rd year of project. The campaigns will organised around 1st of October (International Older People Day) or June 15th (Prevention of older people abuse day)

Activity 2.2 CSO networks participate in policy working groups on topics related to social inclusion and monitor policy implementation of governments

<u>Description</u>: National networks will through their members work on influencing the work of and supporting the creation of national government advisory bodies and working groups that will be active on topics related to the project (e.g. Government's Council for Ageing, different ministerial working groups that produce national strategies and other policies). An independent ongoing activity of each network will be following the implementation of national policies relevant to the project and to disseminate research results and policy recommendation in these working groups.

<u>Justification</u>: Via working with bodies tasked with advising decision makers and policy creation, civil society organisations will help produce lasting changes in their respective societies but will also build their capacities for effective advocacy and maintain a lasting dialogue with governments. Following the implementation of relevant policies will help inform the advocacy activities as unfold and keep them close to the network priorities.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: Members of national networks will increasingly become recognised and credible partners of public sector and policy makers on topics related to ageing and old age and will have increasingly more profound influence on policy creation as the time passes. Additionally, advocacy activities of networks will be closely aligned to the gaps in policy implementation at all times.

<u>Role of partners:</u> Network members will identifying strategic partners in the public sector, matching their needs and capacities, supporting the national initiatives, following the implementation of relevant policies and disseminating policy recommendations.

Duration: ongoing, throughout the project, at least two working groups per network

Activity 2.3. Conduct actions for citizen education and participation in the 5 countries

<u>Description:</u> Relying on the work done in the previous IPA projects in Serbia, Bosnia Herzegovina and Albania with forming and supporting self-help groups for older people at local level, this project will use the experiences, expertise and examples of good practice as well as the existing activists/ self-help groups to identify and motivate older people or organisations of older people in local communities to become active in local level advocacy and mobilization of their peers. Each national network will organise five 1 day workshops with 70 participants per workshop where community representatives can learn about volunteering, community activism, local level advocacy and examples of good practice from previous projects. These community representatives will then be followed over the course of the next five months, provided with support as per request and asked to report about their local level initiatives.

<u>Justification</u>: Through this activity the project will be directly supporting older people at local level to develop skills, acquire knowledge and find motivation to fight social exclusion and isolation and participate in cultural, political and social activities of their local communities but as well to advocate for the different issues relevant to their quality of life. Moreover, feedback from older people participating in these exercise about local level policy implementation, obstacles to exercising the full extent of their rights and actions taken will feed back into the ongoing advocacy efforts adding more evidence-based data to the work of networks.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: 5.000 older people will be engaged at community level through citizen education in total, providing training and support in starting or deepening their own local level efforts at increasing inclusion and participation of older people.

<u>Role of partners:</u> National project manager and national network coordinator will be responsible for organising the workshop (5 workshops per network), providing advisory support and collecting information on local initiatives. The training will be conducted by 2 representatives from the national CSO networks who will also be responsible for the short reports about citizen education initiatives.

Duration: 1 day, around 70 participants per community/CSO, Months 15-24

Activity 2.4 CSO networks organise national panel discussions based on the research results

<u>Description:</u> Each national CSO network will present research results to the public and relevant experts/ decision makers via two connected events: a panel discussion with experts and other stakeholders to discuss the research results will be carried out as well as a press conference for the general public to raise awareness about the launch of the research report.

<u>Justification</u>: The publications and these events will draw attention of stakeholders and general public to the main advocacy issues for each of the national networks within the scope of the project and beyond. The national events will be timed within one or two weeks apart so that they can feed off each other.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: The public and key stakeholders in each country will be aware of the project and its goals as well as of the main advocacy issues for each of the national networks and will be invited to provide support.

<u>Role of partners:</u> Network coordinators will organise the panel discussion and invite relevant stakeholders and representatives of public authorities. The organisation of press conference will be either subcontracted to a profession company (Serbia) or will be undertaken by the CSO networks themselves.

Duration: Months 15, 2nd year

Activity 2.5 – Implementation of sub-grants by grass root initiatives/local NGOs

<u>Description:</u> Each national network will launch a call for small scale project proposals in local communities, focusing on social inclusion of older people at local level as well as advocacy initiatives. A total of at least 60 small local initiatives will be strengthened through sub-grants in the 5 partner countries. These activities will serve as models of good practice and ultimately the basis for advocacy for more local-level adaptation and improved national policy making, while simultaneously stimulating civil society in the pilot communities and fostering engagement with community members, inspiring them to work together to address social exclusion of older people. This activity will be sub-granted to locally active CSOs with expertise in the relevant area, which will implement these activities with support from the national network, national coordinators and their organisations and local authorities, and document the results. The total amount of sub-granting will be 300.000 €, with a minimum of 2.000€ and a maximum of 5.000€ per project. Decisions on which projects will be supported will be made at regional level bearing in mind their quality and capacity for replication, with participation of representatives of each national network and the Austrian Red Cross.

<u>Justification:</u> This activity will demonstrate to community members, decision makers and civil society that context-tailored local-level mobilisation can be effective for increasing inclusion of older people. Through a "learning by doing" approach, local CSOs and other stakeholders will become empowered to address the issue of exclusion in their communities, while providing examples of good practice which can then be used to advocate for a scale up in other regions and countries.

<u>Effectiveness:</u> This activity will draw on the depth of the national networks and individual CSO network members, with expertise in a wide variety of areas related to social inclusion, and of their civil society partners. A total of at least 54 small-scale adaptation projects (sub-granted to locally active CSOs, who are most aware of the needs and vulnerabilities of the target communities, ensuring that the projects remain appropriate for the local context. The projects will form the basis for activity 2.6 below.

<u>Role of partners:</u> The regional project manager, together with network coordinators and network members will develop the call for small scale project. Selection of initiatives will be done at regional level through a selection committee. Network coordinators will be responsible to monitor the progress and documentation of the small-scale adaptation projects, including financial and narrative reports.

Duration: Month: 14-38, 2nd, 3rd and 4th year

Activity 2.6.Publication of an advocacy brochure with good practice examples from sub-grants and advocacy initiatives

<u>Description:</u> Drawing on the experiences from the small scale projects funded through sub-grants scheme where activities have been supported through sub-granting, good-practice examples on advocacy will be collected based on the results of the most successful advocacy initiatives and sub-grants by grass-root initiatives and local NGOs in the communities (see 2.5 above) including (1) lessons learned, (2) how the initiatives/projects could be transferred to other contexts, and (3) identification of opportunities how successful projects may be scaled up nationally and be replicated. The advocacy brochure will be targeted primary at decision-makers to encourage upscaling of successful activities and other interested CSOs as models of good practice, but can also be used for education, awareness-raising and experience sharing.

<u>Justification:</u> Experience from previous projects has shown that there is a clear need for good practices in social inclusion of older people at community level that are appropriate for the national and regional contexts in Western Balkan countries. This activity will contribute towards a better understanding of effective inclusion strategies in the region, as well as a resource for advocating for robust, local inclusion policies at a national level.

<u>Effectiveness:</u> This activity will contribute to effective advocacy by national coordinators, network members and other civil society organisations by providing clear success stories and lessons learned from the small-scale inclusion projects which can then be used for awareness raising and advocacy.

<u>Role of partners:</u> National coordinators will be responsible for selecting appropriate good-practice examples from sub-grants and advocacy initiatives. The project coordinator from RC of Serbia will be responsible for selecting an appropriate company for sub-contracting the layout, design and printing of the regional brochure which will be available in English, Serbian, Macedonian and Albanian.

Duration: Months 39-40, 4th year

ER 3 – Regional networking and knowledge-transfer on social inclusion of older people increased in Western Balkan Countries

Activity 3.1. Conduct a regional network meeting combined with a training session on EU accession/ acquis and proposal writing

<u>Description</u>: The regional workshop (3,5 days) will serve to carry out 2-day training on EU accession and acquisition of projects and proposal writing for 5 representatives of each CSO networks (project partners and including 1-2 members from national CSO networks). The training will be conducted by the Austrian Red Cross and a member from the country EU delegation will be invited to give an input about current developments on EU level. After the training, a 1 ½ day regional network meeting will be carried out.

<u>Justification</u>: EU accession process serves as a catalyst and guiding force for reforms of systems of social and health care in each of the project countries, as well as for creation of public policies related to discrimination, representation, enjoyment of rights and social inclusion. All project countries are at different stages in this process. The workshop should help civil society representatives from each country to recognise and use the opportunities for intervention (within their advocacy priorities and expertise) as well as for capacity building in order to be able to act as relevant and reliable partners to the public sector in the future.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: Representatives from the 5 CSO networks and associate partners will have better grasp on the process through which they will be able to recognise opportunities for advocacy, participation in policy creation, capacity building and work with public sector. In addition, the meeting will an opportunity for regional exchange, learning and planning. Inputs from EU member countries will be provided (including Slovenia)

<u>Role of partners:</u> The 3 ½ days training on EU accession will be conducted by the Austrian Red Cross who has a longstanding experience in this field; OSMIJEH in BiH will organise and host the regional workshop, in Bosnia and Herzegovina, including the 2 day network meeting which will serve to exchange experiences from the research and plan the next steps.

Duration: Months 18, 2nd year, 28 participants

Activity 3.2. CSO networks develop a regional peer exchange programme for CSO network members to allow mutual learning and exchange of best practice

<u>Description:</u> 2-4 representatives of each national CSO network will have the possibility to visit another organisation of a CSO network in one of the other partner countries. The duration of the study visit will be three days and aims to allow for mutual learning and exchange of experiences. The application process for interested persons in the study visit will include a *letter of intent* (including reason for application, expected outcomes of the exchange and organisational benefit, preferred timeframe and host organisation, brief outline how the gained experience will be transferred to colleagues upon return) and a *candidate profile* (CV). The selection of applicants will be based on the quality of the application on the time availability as specified in the letter of intent. Further criteria and final selection of the participants will be jointly developed by the CSO networks at a network coordination meeting.

<u>Justification</u>: These visits will enable representatives of national networks to learn from experience of their regional colleagues and exchange knowledge and common themes throughout the region. Participants of the study visit will prepare a short experience report after the study visit which will include lessons learnt and possible spin-off activities.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: National networks will have adopted new and applicable knowledge gained through visits but also the ties between national networks will grow stronger as their members build relations and ties between each other and interaction between CSOs will be promoted. Additionally, participants benefitting from study visits will be encouraged to share their acquired knowledge and skills with their colleagues in their organisations. As a rough estimate, it is assumed that each beneficiary shares his/her gained knowledge formally or informally with at least 5 co-workers who indirectly benefit from the capacity building activities of this action.

<u>Role of partners</u>: Network coordinators and national project managers will be responsible for the organisation of the peer exchange program and act as contact person for questions and organisational issues. The host organisation shall provide one main contact person who will be responsible for the candidate for the whole period of the visit period.

Duration: months 15-19, 2nd year, 4 participants per country, 3-5 days per exchange

Activity 3.3 Carry out a study visit to Slovenia to allow knowledge-transfer in advocacy

<u>Description</u>: 3 representatives of each national network and 1 representative of associate partners from the public sector from each project countries will go on a study visit to Slovenia to explore the work of at least 4 a very successful national level organisation that deals with ageing, older people, social inclusion and advocacy (at national, EU and local level). During the visit members of national networks will also have a meeting with the representatives of public institutions and members of Ministries relevant for the issues of ageing. The visit will last three days and participants will be selected by the national project manager in consultation with network members.

<u>Justification</u>: The organisation Slovenian Philanthropy is an excellent example of advocacy work for and with older people on the topics such as social inclusion of older people and dialogue with public authorities. Participants of the study visit will define spin-off activities after the regional study visit and will present the lessons learned of the study visit in their organisations, within the national network and at the project website. Slovene government has been most advanced and responsive to older people needs in term of effective policy development. Further, Slovenia is a very good example of participatory and bottom up policy making approaches where older people and CSOs play a key role.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: National networks will study the practical work of a well organised national network and witness the opportunities provided by Europe-wide networking during the process of EU accession and beyond.

<u>Role of partners:</u> The national project managers and network coordinators will select participants for the study visit in consultation with national network members and will be responsible for the organisation of knowledge sharing of lessons learned after the study visit. The overall organisation of the study visit will be carried out by the Slovene Philanthropy in cooperation with the regional project manager.

Duration: Months 9, 1st year, 4 participants per country (including government representatives).

Activity 3.4. Organise a regional conference on social inclusion of older people including governmental stakeholders and international organisations

<u>Description</u>: The 2-day conference will bring together civil society representatives from Western Balkan countries, decision-makers from national and local levels, representatives from the EU, the scientific sectors, media, older people's organisations and from similar initiatives to present project results, lessons learned and jointly discuss regional recommendations on social inclusion. It will be a two day event that will demonstrate in detail the results of project activities and the plans for future regional cooperation and follow-up.

<u>Justification</u>: This event will serve as a public relations event to discuss the practices, successes, challenges and lessons learned during the project in the broader context of stakeholders from all levels and disseminate project results. It will also serve to discuss future cooperation within each of the countries and across the region and jointly develop recommendations.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: Key stakeholders from each country and EU representatives will have learned about the project and its key highlights and be invited to contribute to planning for the future.

<u>Role of partners</u>: National coordinators invite relevant representative from their countries, the regional project manager will invite regional stakeholders and donors. The conference will be organised in Belgrade by the Red Cross of Serbia and bring together app. 120 persons.

Duration: 2 days, Months 35, 3rd year

Activity 3.5 Develop a network website

<u>Description</u>: The project will develop a website that will provide information about project activities and products on national (research results, advocacy strategies) e.g. as well as regional level (e.g. project newsletter, conference report, and advocacy brochure), advocacy initiative and research results and background information. The website will provide information in English but also link to individual subsites per country that will be in local languages, including products and results created throughout the project as well as other relevant documents related to social inclusion, ageing, human rights, legal frameworks etc.

<u>Justification</u>: The project website will display the work and activities of national CSO network as well as regional activities and will be used as a visibility and dissemination tool. The reports and results produced in the course of the project will serve as advocacy tools and be freely available to partner organisations in each of the countries alongside the other relevant documents and resources.

<u>Effectiveness</u>: Each national network will be able to present their work to stakeholders, partners and general public, generate interest among grassroots organisations, provide support to them and ensure wider communication within their country context to promote knowledge sharing among CSOs at regional and national level.

<u>Role of partners:</u> The creation of the website and a joint logo for the 5 CSO networks will be subcontracted to a web designer/communication expert. The maintaining and managing of the English content and country-specific sub-sites will be done by partners.

Duration: ongoing from months 4, 1st year

iii. If financial support is allowed by the Guidelines for Applicants, applicants wishing to give financial support to third parties must define, in line with the conditions set by the Guidelines for Applicants the objectives and results to be obtained with financial support, the different types of activities eligible for financial support, on the basis of a fixed list, the types of entity eligible or categories of persons which may receive financial support, the criteria for selecting these entities and giving the financial support, the criteria for determining the exact amount of financial support for each third entity, and the maximum amount which may be given.

Financial support to Third Parties:

The action foresees the provision of at least 60 sub-grants to grass-root initiatives, local CSOs in the 5 target countries. The total amount of sub grants is $300.000 \in$.

Objectives and results to be obtained with the financial support are the following:

- CSOs conduct awareness raising activities and promote social inclusion of older people
- CSOs address gaps in service provision at local level
- CSOs prepare advocacy initiatives and multi-stakeholder dialogue

Types of activities eligible for financial support are envisaged as follows:

- Coalition building and network activities, such as trainings and workshops

- Provision of small-scale volunteer based basic services for older people that can be tested and then advocated for (e.g. reaching remote and rural, hard to reach areas)

- Preparation of materials for local and national policy dialogue, public awareness raising and education

- Conduction of awareness-raising and educational activities on the topic of social inclusion of

- older people, active ageing, volunteering
- Conduction of local advocacy initiatives
- Conduction of informal education/ lifelong learning

- Conduction of cultural activities with participation of older people

Types of persons or categories of persons which may receive financial support:

- CSO members of the networks and CSOs who are active at local level in the target countries and grass root initiatives.

Criteria for selecting these entities and giving the financial support:

- The activity is within the possible budget frame
- The activity is contributing to the specific objective of the overall project and in line with the project's main aim
- The applicant CSO is well coordinated with the relevant stakeholders for the respective initiative
- The applicant CSO ideally provides some own resources, such as facilities, equipment, expendables, human resources and other sources of funding
- The applicant CSO has the capacity to implement an initiative and related activities and submit financial and narrative reports (to be proven in the project application and budget)
- Only those initiatives will be examined that correspond to a given format
- The applicant CSO must ensure transparency and reliability

Criteria for determining the exact amount of financial support:

- There will be a maximum amount for each activity to be sub-granted, please also see budget
- Each application shall include a detailed budget according to which the grant will be awarded; in the selection procedure special emphasis will be put on efficiency of budgeted funds.
- The following expenses will not be accepted and supported: purchase of bigger equipment, construction and repairs of facilities

The maximum amount which may be given is 5.000 €, the minimum amount is 2.000€.

Necessary supporting documents for financial reporting on subgrants are as follows:

Invoices, bank statements and financial overview.

A contract will be concluded between the partner organization and the selected CSO. This will include a signed application form including description of the action, work plan and budget as well as all requested documents of the organisation (e.g. Registration of organization, tax document, documents certifying the financial capacity of the applicant), narrative report template as well as EU visibility requirements. iv. Describe/highlight eventual changes of the information provided in the concept note.

Activity "gaps in service provision" (A.2.4) in the concept note was deleted. Provision of services that will be bridging identified gaps in service provision will be available for those CSOs that demonstrate the capacity to provide them (e.g. volunteer-based outreach activities for older people in rural areas or similar volunteer-based and therefore more likely to be sustainable activities) however the communication with CSOs from the project countries shows that many of them prefer to be free to come up with creative ways of supporting and building better social inclusion of older people through participation of older people themselves in the design of the activities and local initiatives rather than to be necessarily tied to government standards.

The title of the action was shortened to "Taking Action on Social Inclusion of Older People" instead of "Taking action for strengthened CSO networks and inclusion of older people.

A final capacity development assessment activity has been added under the specific objective to ensure a proper measurement of the organisational change in 30 CSOs and 5 national CSO networks on increasing public awareness and impact in decision-making processes.

Activity 1.6 – networks conduct regular network meetings was combined with activities 0.3, 1.1., 1.3. 2.4. Further country and CSOs Networks specific areas of training will be identified (during the inception phase and in the network meetings) and planned along the national meetings.

After detailed and in depth planning with the partners final budget is decreased by the amount of 3.869 EUR compared to the amount requested in the Concept Note.

2.1.2. Methodology (max 5 pages)

This project is built on three methodological pillars, namely: 1) Building capacities for CSOs through a variety of means such as trainings, peer exchange and study visit; 2) Cooperation with multiple stakeholders e.g. media, public authorities, EU and UN organisation on improving partnership and policy development and 3) Involving older people through CSOs like senior organisation's and pensioner associations in project activities (action on citizen education, sub-grant initiatives) to promote social inclusion and empowerment for older people to take an active role as citizens in shaping their own future.

Capacity building of CSOs through informal training, mentoring, sub granting and peer exchange: The project methodology builds on a holistic capacity development approach of bigger and smaller, as well as stronger and weaker CSOs in the field of social inclusion of older people regarding their engagement with policy makers, the public and the media in Western Balkan countries. This approach will build in-depth knowledge and skills at the local, national and regional level. Targeted trainings will allow CSOs to adapt the acquired knowledge to their local circumstances. Informal trainings and follow up support will be provided by identified consultants in the region and EU partners such as Slovene Philanthropy, the Austrian Red Cross and HelpAge to support this process and to ensure that CSOs have the confidence to put learning into practice. Subsequent project activities, such as public campaigns, evidence-based advocacy, data collection, monitoring of government services and sub-granting initiatives will embed a *learning by doing approach*. Peer exchange, practice sharing and learning will be promoted amongst all involved partners and in almost all activities. Regional meetings, peer exchange visits and study visits will involve network members as well as CSOs of older people representatives. They will learn from each other and apply the acquired knowledge in their context.

Multi-stakeholder Cooperation: All related stakeholders - CSOs, media, public authorities, policy makers, European Commission and international community representatives (UNFPA) will be involved and consulted from the beginning of the project implementation in various activities. CSO networks and project partners will strengthen ties with public authorities and decision-makers through policy working groups and panel discussions, to initiate policy changes and increase awareness about social inclusion of older people. The public sector is also included as associates in the project and policy makers will also be invited to take part in the study visit. Since media representatives are an important partner regarding public awareness, they will be specifically addressed through awareness raising trainings on needs of older people and jointly developing guidelines with project partners. Other CSOs in the area of women issues, health, disability, minority issues, education, etc. will be invited to participate as ageing should be mainstreamed in all these areas and beyond.

Promotion of social inclusion through active ageing and volunteerism: The project will promote social inclusion and active ageing through volunteering, peer support and by involving older people in awareness raising activities and advocacy, thus encouraging them to participate in processes that affect their lives and their communities in general. This will be done through actively encouraging older people organisation's to participate as network members as well as through actions for citizen education, calling for active involvement of older people, promoting in workshops the concepts of self-help groups, peer support and volunteering which proved to be examples of good practice in the region. Sub-granting initiatives will be implemented through grass-root initiatives, local CSOs and network members with the aim to enhance social inclusion activities and advocacy activities on local level.

Where the action continues a previous action, describe how the action is intended to build on the results of the previous action (give the main conclusions and recommendations of any evaluations carried out)

This action builds upon the EC-funded IPA project (2010/254-994) which was implemented by NGO AgeUK with the partners (OSMIJEH – BiH, Red Cross of Serbia, Albanian Association for Gerontology and Geriatrics) in the three countries: Bosnia Herzegovina, Serbia, and Albania. The final project evaluation showed that CSOs, when organised, when having skills, capacities and data can influence governments and initiate partnerships. It also showed that it is very important to look for other partners that can help pursuing the project goals – for example partnership with UN agencies and learning from more advanced EU members. The partners developed a very successful model of older people activism and self-help and showed that older people can and should take an active part in pursuing their rights. However, the evaluation noted that this practice should be further developed and promoted and that governments in particular should get more used to consulting final beneficiaries i.e. older people and involving them more actively in the process of policy development. At the same time the practice should be more promoted among older people and CSOs who still tend to view older people as "receivers of assistance" only. Although the project contributed to awareness raising of older people's needs and influenced the governments to start addressing their needs by developing policies, those processes

remain insufficient, did not get translated into practice enough and older people's rights remain insufficiently recognised by the right bearers. In addition, without CSOs pressure, government often tend to discontinue any efforts or pay less attention to it. The evaluation also noted that older people are placated and included in some dialogue but that this is very far from real partnership, nor effective in delivering older people's rights.

Where the action is part of a larger programme, explain how it fits or is coordinated with this programme or any other possibly planned project (please specify potential synergies with other initiatives, in particular by the European Union)

The project is not part of any larger programme but will for the sake of more powerful influencing and achieving more sustainable goals, strive for synergies with any relevant programme either nationally or regionally. The project is coherent with the new EC IPA strategy 2014-2020 in which CSOs play a crucial role in delivering enlargement policy including social inclusion of vulnerable groups, social protection and promoting respect of principles of democracy and human rights. In Serbia, the Action is also in line with government efforts to implement the Law on Social Welfare and to promote social inclusion and reduce poverty through the Team for Social Inclusion and Poverty Reduction. Review of the National Strategy on Ageing is expected to start in 2015 and the action will feed into that process as well. In BiH the government has initiated the process of policy framework for older people protection. In Albania, there are plans to develop local action plans on ageing based on the national one that was developed in previous actions. In Montenegro the action will feed into the strategy of Social protection of Older People 2013-2016 and into the Law on Social and Child protection which implies a set of reforms that will be very challenging for all CSOs (for example pluralisation of the services and introduction of licensing processes). In FYRM the Action will feed into the Strategy for elderly (2010-2020) that among others aims at (Priority 3) "Improving the quality of life of the elderly". In general, the inception phase will help to better identify all these processes plan the national strategies accordingly in cooperation with relevant stakeholders and the EU.

The procedures for follow up and internal/external evaluation

The overall project monitoring and evaluation will be the task of the Project Management Committee (PMC), which will be made up of project staff from Red Cross of Serbia and representatives of the 5 other project partners in the project. A monitoring plan will be developed in the beginning of the project. The PCM will ensure the quality of project implementation and achievement of results with the participation of, and accountability to, beneficiaries and wider stakeholders. The committee will effectively incorporate evidence and learning into the project cycle and into wider policy development. The regional project manager will pay regular visits to project countries and together with the project partners locally monitor and evaluate project implementation. Again, during those visits various stakeholders will be consulted. Impacts need to be monitored on five different levels: (1) organisational level, (2) local level, (3) network level, (4) national level, and (5) regional level. This will be attained by the installation of a Participatory Impact Monitoring (PIM) system. Network member organisations and relevant stakeholders will be actively involved in continuously tracking changes in the sectors addressed by the project.

Situation analysis: A Situation analysis will be made during the inception phase, as basis for the work plan and revising the network strategies and will provide information on different stakeholders working in that area, gaps in policies and services and needs of older people and CSOs.

Evaluation of capacity building measures - Meeting/Training evaluations: Evaluation forms will be completed after trainings and meetings. They will assess the immediate impact of trainings/ meetings and how they have been perceived by participants and partners. Follow-up questionnaires and interviews will also be used at the end of the project to assess the long-term effectiveness of project trainings and the way learning has been applied by members of CSOs and older people. Senior management staff and representatives of 30 CSOs as well as external stakeholders such as representatives of public authorities will be asked to evaluate the improvement of CSO capacities during the final evaluation. In order to be able to compare capacities of SCOs in the beginning of the project and the end, a baseline will be carried out within the situational analysis in the inception phase.

Public campaigning evaluation: Public views and opinion will be evaluated by media reports, press clippings and project website accesses.

Internal midpoint review: This will be conducted by Austrian Red Cross with support of project partners. The project progress will be compared against the project plan, including financial projections. Any variations to plans will be communicated to the EC as appropriate. Project staff will also meet via Skype at least once per month to discuss and review project progress and minutes will be available.

Small grant project evaluation: All sub grants that will be implemented by CSOs in the national networks will submit a narrative and financial report, including lessons learned. Ongoing monitoring will be done by the project partners.

Regular four month financial monitoring: Financial spending will be monitored by Red Cross of Serbia against the approved EC budget to ensure that all expenditure is tracked and in line with approved budgets. These figures will then formally be reviewed by Red Cross finance department, with spending cross-referenced to activities to ensure value-for-money in project delivery. This regular oversight and review will enable project staff to identify and address variations at an early stage.

Final evaluation: The final evaluation will be conducted by an external consultant. This will be supported by project partners who will draw up terms of reference and provide information, evidence and logistical support to the consultant, including facilitating visits to network members and representatives of local and national authorities as appropriate.

The role and participation in the action of the various actors and stakeholders (co-applicant(s), affiliated entity(ies), target groups, local authorities, etc.), and the reasons why these roles have been assigned to them

Red Cross of Serbia (RCS) as applicant of the action will be responsible for overall project and financial management, technical support to partners and EC communication and relationship. The Red Cross of Serbia will also implement the respective activities in its own country.

OSMIJEH, AAGG, Mac RC, RCM and Humanost as co-applicants will manage the project nationally, take care of the implementation of all activities in accordance to project plan and objectives, communicate with the RCS, report to RCS regularly and monitor and evaluate the project implementation nationally. Project partners will be responsible for communication with the CSO members of the national networks.

CSOs organised in the national networks: CSOs will be encouraged to apply for subgrants to implement projects promoting inclusion of older people and advocacy initiatives locally. CSOs will furthermore take part in the network meetings as well as capacity building activities such as trainings, peer exchange program and the study visit. CSOs will also be responsible for supporting the dissemination of information of the project, such as project publications to older people, the wider public, and to local and national decision makers as appropriate.

The *Austrian Red Cross* will be responsible for providing technical assistance on grant management to all partners and the Red Cross of Serbia, carry out the midterm-evaluation as self-evaluation together with project partners and conduct the training on EU accession and acquis.

Slovene Philanthropy will organise and host the study visit to Slovenia to allow knowledge transfer in advocacy and networking. *HelpAge International* will provide a special input at the regional kick-off workshop on researching data and advocacy as consultancy in the beginning. The two EU partners and HelpAge international will ensure EU practice sharing and learning and will function as link to global and EU processes dealing with ageing and related policies.

National governments, state service providers, CSO service providers, media and local governments and administrations will be targeted through various activities. They will be encouraged to share the information on their work, to develop age friendly policies, to improve the existing or introduce new services for older people that better address their rights. Local media will be approached to cooperate with the national CSO Networks and to build their capacities in working with media and using them as partners in pursuing their objectives; to publish the findings of the situation analysis, national research findings, information on policy recommendations and on project progress in general.

UN offices, especially UNFPA, will be targeted and involved as they represent a key ally in the process of influencing the government. They will also provide, through UNDESA, funding to the government (support of the Council on Ageing for example) and take forward the issues of ageing on a regional and global level. Representatives of UN offices will be invited to regional and national meetings, the final conference and to contribute with their expertise to the strategic work plans within the inception phase.

The main means proposed for the implementation of the action (equipment, materials, and supplies to be acquired or rented): The action will provide for 6 laptops to the partners in the WB region. Besides the laptops, the action does not request purchasing of any other equipment or supplies. RCS and the partners in the project will contribute their own resources (e.g. office furnishings, equipment, project vehicle).

The attitudes of all stakeholders towards the action in general and the activities in particular:

The project was developed in cooperation with all implementing partners as well as in consultations with the associate partners. Government representative were also informally consulted. Knowledge, practice and assessment of the situation is based on previous practices.

CSOs in the 5 partner countries: CSOs in the region have been making efforts for years to raise awareness among governments to recognise older people as a vulnerable group and to better recognise rights abuses. However, they are well aware that their capacities are still underdeveloped to better influence the governments to recognise them as credible partners, to make them more accountable and to influence the policies. Their attitude towards the action is very positive as they know that without their activities and their "pressure" their government would easily put the processes dealing with older people aside. CSOs have requested support through this project, to strengthen their coordination and cooperation to become a more effective network. CSOs are therefore highly supportive of the project aims and objectives.

Relevant ministries, local and regional government entities: Public authorities expressed their interest for robust evidence to support policy-making, and increase the capacity of CSOs to be effective partners for government in delivering and monitoring services and agreed to be associates in the project. (E.g. the Social Inclusion and Poverty Reduction Unit in Serbia, the Ministry of Labour and Social Welfare in Montenegro and Institute for Social Protection in Macedonia). Ministry of Human Rights and Refugees in BiH, leading the process on the policy framework for older people protection in BiH is positively oriented towards the project and has been interested in more productive cooperation with CSOs. Ministry of Health, Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs in Albania are also positively oriented towards better cooperation with the civil society. Governments in the region like comparing themselves in terms of policies, legislation and work in general, thus regional cooperation and exchanges are something they welcome. However, all those interests, tendencies do not get translated into practice without a coordinated effort. Therefore, the action proposed will contribute to this.

Media: Media is also positively oriented towards the action. While their interest in covering issues where older people's rights are extremely violated (for example elder abuse, disability..) is much higher, there is less practice in viewing more positive images of ageing where older people are presented as active agents of changes. In order to better use the role of media, their involvement in the action will be better targeted and actions with CSOs more coordinated.

Public service providers such as local health services, social workers and police are the most inclined to actively or passively discriminate against older people by denying them access to services. The project will invite them to relevant meetings (national network meetings as appropriate) and they will also be invited to take part in the inception phase.

Older people who will be directly reached through citizen education activities. Final beneficiaries will be all older people in the five countries who will benefit from and will be empowered by improved social inclusion, more opportunities for social engagement and active participation in matters of importance. Older people in the region welcome the action but are concerned that they lack information and capacity to act and speak up. This project will address this concern and improve older people's representative capacity to more effectively represent vulnerable older people within their own communities. This will strengthen their capacity to address rights violations and ensure improved access to services.

UN/UNFPA offices in the regions have very positive attitudes towards ageing issues and working with the government. The Offices in BiH and Serbia are specially focused on ageing in their national programme plans. The similar practice can be promoted in other countries in the region. Further, better coordination among all stakeholders can be pursued in the proposed project.

Key international organisations such as Austrian Red Cross, Slovene Philanthropy, and HelpAge International (HAI) are some of the rare international organisation that have been interested in dealing with older people issues in the region. They have great expertise, knowledge and are actively involved in key global processes related to ageing and older people human rights. Their role is very important in the project proposed and their interest to contribute very high. UN organisations (UNFPA) as well as European Commission will be involved in consultations.

The planned activities in order to ensure the visibility of the action and the EU funding: In the first project quarter a communication and visibility plan will be elaborated by the project team. With the help of this plan the project team will ensure that all communication (e.g. project newsletter, invitations, media releases), visibility materials (roll-up banners, posters) and project products (e.g. national research reports,) are in line with the EU visibility guidelines. In order to ensure information exchange and dissemination, the project team will coordinate project activities with the EU delegation in charge. This will be provided through bi-lateral meetings and invitations to bigger project events. The invitations to the meetings, trainings, conferences as well as agendas and any written material or stationery will display the EU funding. Any public event, especially public campaigning events will display the logo of EU. Partners will produce project roll-up banners that will display the information on the project in the local and English languages and on EU funding too. The banners will be displayed in all project and public activities and events.

2.1.3. Indicative action plan for implementing the action (max 4 pages)

2.1.5. Sustainability of the action (max 3 pages)

Technical impact: The project will build technical capacity of staff and volunteers from co-applicants and CSOs in the 5 national networks. Technical skills will be improved in areas including strategic planning, data collection, advocacy, public (including media) campaigning, evidence-based policy influencing, older people involvement, active ageing and volunteering as well as promotion of social inclusion. The impact upon at least 50 targeted CSOs will also be an improved ability to work with and on behalf of older people, better skills in running their organisations and better internal and external communication mechanisms within the network and with public authorities. The project will target various stakeholders (at least 25 government and public institutions/service provider institutions, UN offices, local administrations, media, etc.). The situation analysis, advocacy briefs, data collection and monitoring findings will be followed up by targeted advocacy and public campaign actions. This will increase the technical knowledge of service providers and policy makers, thus increasing their understanding of the needs of older people and the barriers they face. This will enable them to better address older people's rights and to design and deliver improved age-friendly services.

Economic impact: The project will strive for improvement of economic conditions for older people in the 5 countries in the region by advocating for policies that will better address older people's needs and promote their social inclusion. The specially organised education activities for older people on their rights, citizenship roles, opportunities and way to act will empower older people to better access their rights to services. This will lead to more positive economic impact. Evidence based advocacy and campaigning will also call for improved provision of services at local and national levels. Locally implemented projects promoting social inclusion of older people will demonstrate the need and feasibility for introduction of the services in the budgets by local governments. This will impact on the development of future policies and government programmes of support, which will again have a positive impact upon the economic well-being of targeted older people.

Social impact: The action will help local CSOs to improve services and evidence their claims, which will strengthen their legitimacy. In some cases, improved capacity may also result in partnerships with local authorities on delivering social programmes, which will widen CSOs capacity further and ensure their sustainability. Nationally and regionally the action will raise the profile of the ageing sector and help the 5 networks to better represent older people. This increased visibility will help to improve both the selfesteem of older people and the status of the CSO sector. It will also counter negative stereotypes of older people as passive net welfare drains on society, showing them instead as active and capable volunteers and activists. Furthermore older volunteers will be centrally involved throughout the project through CSOs like senior organisations or pensioner associations and will benefit from activities like citizen education activities.

Policy level impact: The action will build the capacity of the national CSO networks to generate evidence, to implement community based services with older people, to monitor the delivery of services for older people by the governments and to influence local and national state representatives. Local and national advocacy and public campaigning (2 national advocacy campaigns per network) will address the issue of ageing and older people's rights in all 5 countries and will have an impact on the wider policy debates around demographic ageing in particular. The increased recognition of the national networks as focal points on ageing will mean they are invited to participate in policy consultations, and that will potentially lead to improved policies to support older people nationally. The increased involvement of the CSOs networks in policy dialogue is expected to lead to increased mainstreaming of ageing in public policy.

Describe a dissemination plan

The key aim of this project is to strengthen the capacities of 5 CSO networks and at least 50 members and the way they share information and collaborate. National as well as regional meetings will involve relevant stakeholders and will be used as an opportunity to share information. Members of the national CSO networks will be expected to disseminate further the information, learning and practice in their local communities where they are active, throughout the countries. Older people representatives will also be expected and invited to share the information further among their peers in their localities or organisations. Project publications will include: the inception report, publication of research results, advocacy brochures with good-practice examples from subgrants and quarterly newsletter. Especially the situation analysis and research findings will be disseminated by organising public launching with media coverage. Documents will be also available on partners' websites as well as on the project website. Project staff will also seek to disseminate project learning through existing publications and other media in their respective countries and through participation in various related CSO and government network meetings as part of

project activities. The dissemination will be assured by using various social networks such as the project website that will be developed within the project and the IPA CSF face book group.

Provide a detailed risk analysis and contingency plan.

Economic risk: *Exchange rate risk.* The project is denominated in Euros. If the euro falls significantly it will affect the affordability of various aspects of the project. In this case the project may, in coordination with EU Delegation staff, look to reforecast the budget and reduce spending.

Economic risk: National/international economic pressures lead to reduced governmental budgetary commitment toward older people: Likelihood low; Impact high. Based on the growing recognition within government of the impact of demographic change in the region, a reduced commitment is not expected. The project focuses on enabling civil society to contribute to existing momentum in this area, and ensuring that government are provided with compelling evidence and support, at both national and local levels, to ensure that ageing remains on the political agenda and those policies and programmes of work are given sufficient budget support.

Social risk: Members of the CSO network, are not motivated, willing to learn or able to absorb new knowledge, methodology and approaches in the action: Likelihood low; impact high. This is low risk due to high commitment, long experiences and high literacy rates among CSOs and lessons learnt from the previous cooperation which proved that, when provided with the opportunities, CSOs and older people are very willing to participate, to learn, to contribute to act and feel useful. To reduce risk, selection of participants will be done carefully, and training will be delivered to reflect the skills and learning needs of trainees. The trainings will apply interactive methods of work, reflection by all participants based on their practical work, constructive learning process, etc.

Describe the main preconditions and assumptions during and after the implementation phase.

A relatively stable political and security situation in Western Balkan countries is a precondition for the project implementation, including an enabling environment for national and local CSO development. Further a commitment from governmental authorities at local, national and regional level to support an open and constructive dialogue and cooperation with CSOs and older people is assumed. Relations between partners, members of CSO networks and media shall remain positive and CSOs will be supportive of and committed to the project aims. According to previous discussions it is assumed that other stakeholders such as the UN, will be open to contribute to project activities. The project assumes further that older people remain willing and keen to participate in project activities.

Explain how the action will be made sustainable after completion.

Financial sustainability: The project creates few financial obligations for Red Cross of Serbia neither for other partners in the project and regional network. The project will fund no infrastructure requiring future maintenance, and activities will involve training and capacity building of CSOs, older people. Subsequent activities will be largely volunteer-based, or absorbed into the existing work of CSOs. The project will aim to develop closer ties between network members and local/national governments. Small grant projects will be supported to demonstrate the need for existence of local services as well as feasibility. It is highly possible that once CSOs raise awareness on issues facing older people, and become valued as experts, local authorities may even offer financial support, or explore areas for future collaboration. The same relates to UN agencies, particularly UNFPA, who can in accordance to their country plan provide financial support, not only to government, but also to CSOs. Mainstreaming of ageing will lead to influencing international donors and development agencies to better prioritise ageing which again offers potential for funding. The partners in the project will together and specially with the support of EU partners, look to explore subsequent funding opportunities outside and beyond this project.

Institutional sustainability: Capacity building is a key methodology to ensure that skills and knowledge are sustained beyond the implementation phase. The project will build the capacities of CSOs in the 5 CSOs networks and OPG representatives. The project will deliver training and will then support CSOs to 'learn by doing' throughout all subsequent project activities. These processes and activities will not only build the institutional capacity and sustainability of individual members of the Networks, but also of the network as a functioning institution itself. Once such capacity is established, they will be easily sustained beyond the project. Further, the project will also establish and strengthen dialogue mechanisms between the 5 CSO networks, UN agencies and key local and national stakeholders (governmental and NGO). The project will contribute to raising the profile of the national CSO Networks as a key voice on ageing, ensuring that decision makers go to the network when conducting policy consultations or reviewing the

effectiveness of their work. Once such mechanisms are established, they will again be sustained beyond the project.

Policy level sustainability: Both, during and beyond the project, targeted CSOs will use project evidence to raise the awareness of policy makers of the critical and interconnected roles of service provision, pensions and adequate social benefits for older people in achieving poverty reduction and reducing social marginalisation. The project places a major emphasis on establishing and strengthening quality communication and coordination between CSOs and policy makers, to ensure that information flows and advocacy are effective, both within and beyond the project. A key outcome of the project is therefore that CSOs become increasingly invited by policy makers to participate in consultation processes. These links, once established, will be sustained beyond the project cycle.

Environmental sustainability: Unnecessary transportation by car will be avoided as much as possible. The project will apply an environmental approach when it comes to office materials and waste
